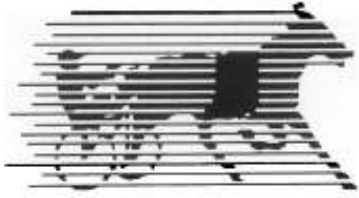

ISA Political Action Report

The ISA is an active supporting member of the Indiana Horse Racing and Breeding Coalition. The Coalition combines the interests of the three breeds: Standardbred, Thoroughbred, Quarter Horse, and the two Indiana Pari-Mutuel Racetracks: Hoosier Park and Indiana Downs. The goal of the coalition is to pass legislation for alternative (slots) gaming at both racetracks. Benefits to Standardbred horsemen and women are estimated at \$30,000,000 + to be used for increased Breed Development funding, fair racing, stakes racing, and overnight purses. The bill also includes 200 days of Standardbred racing. The state of Indiana would get an estimated \$200,000,000 for revenue to be used as legislators see fit such as: kindergarten or property tax relief, etc.

The help of all horsemen and women is needed to contact their legislators and let them know how important alternative gaming (slots) is for the Standardbred Industry. Your personal contact with legislators in your district is of the greatest importance. Only you can make the contacts and tell your personal story of your involvement in the industry.

ISA Breeder's and Sales Report

Steve Cross, Sale Manager for the Hoosier Classic Yearling Sale, commented that he was very happy with the sale overall. Their average was up almost 25% over last year's sale, averaging \$3,517. He felt that they had too many "outs", but they did not have many "RNA's." The first session of the "Elite" sold well averaging \$6,100. Tim Konkle, Sale Manager for the Indiana Standardbred Yearling Sale, is very optimistic about his up-coming sale.

It appears that there are still too many "cheap" mares being bred in Indiana. However, the number of cheap mares being bred is on a decline. Approximately 60 yearlings less than last year will be sold in the 2006 sales.

Both sale managers (along with a lot of other horsemen) agree that Indiana needs to increase the purses for the sire's stakes legs. They feel this would raise the prices for yearlings that the breeders would benefit from. The money would have to come from the finals or by increasing the nomination and sustaining payments. Many feel that the ISA should lobby the Standardbred Breed Development to accomplish this task.

ISA Membership Committee Report

The Membership Committee promotes a variety of ISA projects when the opportunity arises. This year the ISA paid memberships have surpassed the 700 mark.

The Annual Awards Banquet has been scheduled for Saturday, February 3, 2007 at the Indianapolis Hilton North. Our committee organizes and promotes this event cooperatively with the IHRC, Standardbred Breed Development Committee and the IHRC Standardbred Advisory Board with Jessica Barnes and Kelly Roush representing these boards. We cooperate with the Indiana Standardbred Hall of Fame, Ellen Taylor, Executive Director, and their induction ceremonies are usually held in conjunction with the Annual Awards Banquet. Hoosier Park and Indiana Downs also make contributions to this well attended event.

In addition, we guide the Track Chaplain and Visiting Nurse Programs, assisted by Megan Sundeen, ISA Executive Secretary. Our committee works cooperatively with the Public Relations Committee, Mark Benvenga, Chairman. This year a very popular T-Shirt and Hat project was orchestrated at Hoosier Park with the assistance of our Public Relations Committee. Numerous requests from horsemen necessitated ordering more t-shirts on two separate occasions.

The Pizza Party held once a month in the Hoosier Park Paddock was very well received in 2006. We ordered 40 large pizzas which were consumed quickly during those cool spring nights. This year we have expanded the program to include providing the horsemen with sack lunches or pizza. Another project initiated during the hot summer months was to provide everyone in the race paddock on a nightly basis with lemonade and ice tea.

The ISA Board of Directors voted unanimously for the project when proposed and was very generous in allocating the money to pay for the cost. The many "thank you" comments received made the project all worth while. At least two committee members were present each week to assist with serving the horsemen.

A new addition to our committee projects this year was suggested by our Horsemen's Representative, Jesse Larkins. The ISA Board of Directors voted to treat the Sires Stakes participants in the finals with a buffet meal prepared by the track kitchen.

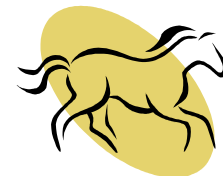
In conclusion, the ISA Board of Directors is very pleased with the favorable response received from horsemen that these programs have generated.

Anti-Inflammatory Effective Sept 1, 2006

One of the three approved types of anti-inflammatory medicines may be used when racing a horse. **Upon entering a horse to race on an anti-inflammatory medicine you must use the following code on the entry card: phenylbutazone (B), flunixin (F), ketoprofen (K).** These three anti-inflammatory medicines may not exceed the following permitted serum or plasma threshold concentrations which are consistent with administration by a single intravenous injection at the recommended labeled doses at least twenty-four (24) hours before post time for the race in which the horse is entered: Phenylbutazone (or its metabolite oxyphenylbutazone) – 5 micrograms per milliliter, Flunixin (banamine) – 20 nanograms per milliliter, and Ketoprofen – 10 nanograms per milliliter. These or any other NSAID are prohibited to be administered within the twenty-four (24) hours before post time for the race in which the horse is entered. The presence of more than one of the three approved NSAIDs, with the exception of Phenylbutazone in a concentration below 1 microgram per milliliter of serum or plasma or any unapproved NSAID in the post-race serum or plasma sample is not permitted. The use of all but one of the approved NSAIDs shall be discontinued at least forty-eight (48) hours before the post time for the race in which the horse is entered.

IHRC Rule 71 IAC8-1-4.1

**Revised IHRC Rule on Foreign Substance**

No horse participating in a race shall carry in its body any foreign substance except as provided by these rules. A finding by the chemist or commission designee that a foreign substance is present in the test sample shall be prima facie evidence that such foreign substance was administered and carried in the body of the horse while participating in a race. Such a finding shall also be taken as prima facie evidence that the trainer and his or her agents responsible for the care or custody of the horse have been negligent in the handling or care of the horse. The prohibition and allowance of foreign substances in this article shall apply to qualifying races. Upon the finding of a violation of this section, including test results or an overage of phenylbutazone, flunixin, ketoprofen or furosemide in violation of these rules, the owners or lessees of the horse from which the specimen was obtained shall forfeit any purse money and any trophy or award.

IHRC Rule 71 IAC 8-1-2

New IHRC Ruling on Furosemide (Salix)

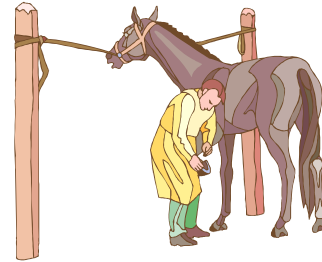
Effective August 1, 2006 - Furosemide may be administered intravenously to a horse, which is entered to compete in a race. Except under the instructions of the official veterinarian or the racing veterinarian for the purpose of removing a horse from the Veterinarian's List or to facilitate the collection of a post-race urine sample, Furosemide shall be permitted only after the official veterinarian has placed the horse on the Furosemide List.

In order for a horse to be placed on the list the following process must be followed: (1) After the horse's licensed trainer and licensed veterinarian determine that it would be in the horse's best interests to race with Furosemide they shall notify the official veterinarian or his/her designee, using the prescribed form, that they wish the horse to be put on the Furosemide List. (2) The form must be received by the official veterinarian or his/her designee by the proper time deadlines so as to ensure public notification. (3) A horse placed on the official Furosemide List must remain on that list unless the licensed trainer and licensed veterinarian submit a written request to remove the horse from the list. The request must be made to the official veterinarian or his/her designee, on the proper form, no later than the time of entry. (4) After a horse has been removed from the Furosemide List, the horse may not be placed back on the list for a period of 60 calendar days unless it is determined to be detrimental to the welfare of the horse, in consultation with the official veterinarian. If a horse is removed from the official Furosemide List a second time in a 365 day period, the horse may not be placed back on the list for a period of 90 calendar days. (5) Furosemide shall only be administered on association grounds. (6) Upon the request of the regulatory agency designee, the veterinarian administering the authorized bleeder medication shall surrender the syringe used to administer such medication which may then be submitted for testing. (7) The horse must be treated at least 4 hours prior to post time. (8) Medication administered by a veterinarian licensed by the commission at an intravenous dose level not to exceed 500 milligrams and no less than 150 milligrams. Administration of the Furosemide shall take place in the test barn or a specific location otherwise designated by the commission. (9) Out-of-state horses may be automatically eligible to receive Furosemide provided that the jurisdiction from which it was shipped qualified it as a bleeder using criteria satisfactory to this state. The USTA, the breed registry foal certificate, or bleeder certificate may be utilized in determining a horse's eligibility to receive Furosemide.

IHRC Policy on Bleeder Adjunct Medication

Approved July 25, 2006 – The Indiana Horse Racing Commission is fully supportive of the Racing Medication and Testing Consortium's (RMTC) efforts to fund studies aimed at determining the effectiveness of bleeder adjunct medication. The IHRC will refrain from considering the use of any race day bleeder adjunct medication until such time that appropriate scientific evidence has been established. The IHRC will consider bleeder adjunct medication upon recommendation from the RMTC and development of Association of Racing Commissioners International (RCI) model rules.

**RHINO VACCINATIONS DUE Every 6 Months!****Mare & Foal Struck by Lightning**

On August 1, 2006 the mare JANUARY ICE (in foal to Mark Johnathan) and her 4 month old Mark Johnathan colt were struck by lightning and killed instantly. The mare was at Bud Richman's farm in Daleville, Ind. Bud's daughter had just fed the mare and foal in the pasture when the rain started. She made it back to the barn before the storm hit. Upon entering the barn she heard a loud crack of lightning and turned around to find the mare and foal had been struck in the pasture right where she had just fed them.

Valiante Farewell Picnic

The I.S.A., Indiana Downs, and Hoosier Park hosted a farewell picnic for Jim and Brenda Valiante. The Valiante's have owned the tack supply shop at both race tracks for 14 years. 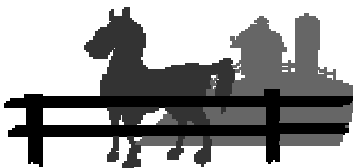
Elizabeth 'Betty' Bowen Smith (1918 to 2006)

Dear Commissioners:

During the 2006 Racing Season horsemen have been penalized with enormous fines and extensive suspensions given by the judges and your Executive Director, Joe Gorajec. We appreciate Mr. Gorajec acknowledging stiffer fines and penalties as per our request to the proposal of "Integrity '06" in our January letter to you. However, we are concerned that a large sum was taken from the horsemen's purse account to fund this project that has not fulfilled the integrity issues with consistency. Mr. Gorajec has omitted a crucial component to uphold integrity; communication.

Here in Indiana the Executive Director for the Indiana Horse Racing Commission does not utilize a procedure for immediate notification. We find this very alarming and that it warrants questioning of Mr. Gorajec's motives. It is not excusable that our horsemen were allowed to continue making mistakes with overages of medication, and not notified of positive drug tests until weeks later. In many other racing jurisdictions there is immediate notification to the horsemen if any overages of medications are found through their testing procedures. This proper procedure has not been administered in the state of Indiana.

DVM Scott Waterman, Executive Director of the Racing Medication and Testing Consortium (RMTC), suggests that the drug dexamethasone, given in an improper timeline prior to racing, may have a euphoric effect. By not taking immediate action to stop the administration of the drug, Mr. Gorajec, is therefore guilty of defrauding the betting public. Instead, Mr. Gorajec accumulated the drug positives over a time period rather than demonstrating integrity and assisting with correction of the problem that was growing larger by the day.

The betting public would be outraged if they knew the Horse Racing Commission continued to allow these horses to race with the possibility of affecting the outcome. Our Horse Racing Industry survives on our purse structure which, in turn, is achieved by the public wagering. Common decency and fairness dictate that horsemen should be notified in a timely manner about any jurisdiction or medication issues affecting horse racing in the state of Indiana. The horsemen can see no legitimate reason for Mr. Gorajec's inaction other than to create headlines and make the horse racing industry look nefarious.

Our horsemen cannot demonstrate integrity if they have not been notified with guidelines and the consequences for overages of therapeutic medications given to their horses. By providing every horsemen, at the time of licensing or when changes have been made, with knowledge of the time frame that these drugs cannot be administered prior to racing would have eliminated many of the fines and penalties set forth by your Executive Director. Furthermore, Mr. Gorajec has manipulated the thresholds for these tests so that a dosage may have been permitted one day but would be an infraction the next day. Once again, we reiterate that there is a lack of consistency with "Integrity '06." All owner's, trainer's, driver's and caretaker's should have been provided a list of the changes to the drug testing procedures. This would have been the proper protocol and the best deterrent to ensure that our horsemen were demonstrating integrity. For example; the primary drug that has warranted these stiff fines and penalties is dexamethasone, a Class 4 drug. Phenylbutazone is also listed in this same classification of drugs. Current Indiana law allows the medication of phenylbutazone twenty-four (24) hours prior to racing.

If horsemen are required to follow the "Integrity '06" rule, then the horsemen and the betting public should not have to question Mr. Gorajec's accountability for ensuring integrity. We believe it is in the Commissions best interest to investigate the reasoning and behavior of the Executive Director, Mr. Joe Gorajec.
